- A policy and legislation clearinghouse








Step 1: Know the Options



- Funded in 2009 to conduct a national survey
- Continue to manage the database as a service – no longer funded
- All data is self-reported by the programs
- There may be programs that are not listed in this database
- College Search is meant to make people aware of the options – more research will be required to learn the details of program operations

#### **COLLEGE OPTIONS for STUDENTS with INTELLECTUAL DISABILITY, November 2019**




Slow and steady growth in approved CTPs

#### COLLEGE OPTIONS offering Federal Financial Aid, November 2019 (N=105)





#### **CONDUCTING A COLLEGE SEARCH: QUESTIONS TO ASK COLLEGE PROGRAMS**

onducting a college search is a daunting task for every family and every potential college student. All students need to think about factors such as the size of the college, its location, and whether or not to live on campus or at home (see Figure 1).

For students with intellectual disability (ID), there are some additional aspects to consider beyond the details you can learn in Think College Search. This resource provides questions, suggested by parents and students who have been through the college search process.

These questions may be answered by closely reviewing the college program websites, attending an Open House, or calling the program director. A great place to identify possible options is Think College Search, a searchable database of college programs on the Think College website. There you will find basic information on over 270 college programs for students with intellectual disability. Learn more about it on page 2.
