
Admissions Requirements

- Successfully completed a high school program (served under IDEA)
- 3rd grade reading level preferred
- Basic mathematics understanding and ability to use a calculator
- Ability to use a computer to communicate and gather information
- Ability to function independently for a sustained period of time
- •No significant behavioral or emotional problems that would impact school performance or social interaction
- Potential to be successful in competitive employment situations
- Desire and motivation to complete a post-secondary program
- •Willingness to complete all assignments with support

We strongly recommend that applicant be on an active Vocational Rehabilitation caseload

Difference between High School and College

Advocacy

In high school, parents are actively involved in advocating for appropriate services and supports for their children. Schools reach out to parents and their participation is required. Parents talk directly to their child's teachers on a regular basis.

In college, students are expected to advocate for themselves. Parent involvement may be discouraged at times. College faculty and staff do not typically communicate with parents directly.



IDEA vs. ADA

IDEA is intended to guarantee persons with disabilities a free and appropriate primary and secondary education to ensure success.

ADA doesn't guarantee successful learning or mandate the creation of special programs for persons with disabilities. ADA is about access.

Educational Support

High schools develop and must follow the IEP. Core modifications of classes and materials are required. The School, with student and family input, is responsible for arranging for accommodations and modifications.

There are no IEPs in college. The Disability Services Office will develop an accommodation plan based on documentation of disability that is provided by the student after a student requests a ccommodations.

Why do we prepare much?



For Students:

College is a new world with LOTS to navigate. Students should be able to come to college with some knowledge of independence skills and some preparing on how-to problem solve. The target is to slowly introduce this new world of resources and possibilities instead of throwing the students out to swim. Example: accessing classes, new technology systems, dorm life, high school vs. college



For Parents:

The level of support and the art of parenting changes. Instead of completing tasks for them, it requires more instruction on HOW to do something. Parents have to develop a new type of relationship of communication and processes to work through. Example: FERPA, financial management, calling home, dorm boundaries





Open House

A chance for prospective students and parents to engage in an informational session and tour the KSU college

Summer Intensive

A week-long program allowing students that are interested in college the opportunity to try it out first

Pizza Meet and Greet

A social for all incoming students and parents allowing them to meet existing students and engage in a discussion with Housing

Orientation

Three-days with the purpose of preparing students and parents with necessary resources before first day of classes

Open House

Each semester, the Academy hosts a series of Open Houses with presentations from the Academy staff with extensive information of our program (i.e. cost, admissions requirements, components of the program, additional resources). Following is a Q&A session with Academy students and mentors with a campus tour for prospective students





Summer Intensive



Summer Intensive

Our week-long summer intensive program experience gives learners confidence as they explore the campus, access services and resources, and collaborate on a college-level presentation. Social skills, executive functioning, and classroom discourse at this major university are a focus of this exemplary program. Students are able to pick one week session out of the choices (typically two or three).

Pizza Meet and Greet

Each spring (typically March), we host a mixer for all enrolled Academy students to meet the incoming students and parents. Housing staff is also in attendance with a presentation. Students get a chance to tour the campus with enrolled students, while connected with their roommates. Parents are given the opportunity to ask questions before families go home with a study guide to practice before school begins.





Orientation





Orientation

The week prior to beginning of fall semester, students and parents are invited to spend three days in different sessions to prepare them for a successful year. The sessions include conversations with campus police, Counseling and Psychological Services, KSU Health Clinic, the campus dietician, and others. Parents and students sit in different rooms as they review the student handbook and ask questions of the student and mentor panel.

Parents and students are able to connect with other incoming students and parents as they become familiar with the new environment of college. There are plenty of opportunities to tour campus, meet Academy staff, students, and mentors, visit different resources on campus, learn new technology systems, and ask questions.



Why this works:

- Students and parents become fully integrated into campus prior to first day of classes.
- Students and parents know what the expectations are
- Students and parents know resources and when and how to use what
- Student can navigate the campus
- It eases nerves and the anxious "this is too new and different"
- If students are not ready yet, they are prepared before paying for a semester's tuition
